OJJDP FY 2022 Multistate Mentoring Programs Initiative

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Overview

The <u>U.S. Department of Justice</u> (DOJ), <u>Office of Justice Programs</u> (OJP), <u>Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention</u> (OJJDP) is seeking applications for funding for the fiscal year (FY) 2021 Multistate Mentoring Programs Initiative. This program furthers the Department's mission by supporting mentoring programs to reduce juvenile delinquency, drug abuse, victimization, and high-risk behaviors such as truancy.

This solicitation incorporates the <u>OJP Grant Application Resource Guide</u> by reference. The OJP Grant Application Resource Guide provides guidance to applicants on how to prepare and submit applications to OJP for funding. **If this solicitation expressly modifies any provision in the OJP Grant Application Resource Guide**, the applicant is to follow the guidelines in this solicitation as to that provision.

Submission Information

Applications will be submitted to DOJ in two steps:

<u>Step 1:</u> The applicant must submit by the Grants.gov deadline the required Application for Federal Assistance standard form (SF)-424 and a Disclosure of Lobbying Activities (SF-LLL) form when they register in Grants.gov at https://www.grants.gov/web/grants/register.html. To register in Grants.gov, the applicant will need to ensure that its System for Award Management (SAM) registration is current.

<u>Step 2</u>: The applicant must then submit the **full application**, including attachments, in JustGrants at <u>JustGrants.usdoj.gov</u>. To be considered timely, the full application must be submitted in JustGrants by the JustGrants application deadline. OJP encourages applicants to review the "How to Apply" section in the <u>OJP Grant Application</u> Resource Guide and the JustGrants website for more information, resources, and training.

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Program Description

Overview

OJP is committed to advancing work that promotes civil rights and racial equity, increases access to justice, supports crime victims and individuals impacted by the justice system, strengthens community safety and protects the public from crime and evolving threats, and builds trust between law enforcement and the community. This solicitation provides funding for applicant organizations to enhance and expand mentoring services for youth populations that are at risk or high risk for juvenile delinquency, victimization, and juvenile justice system involvement. There are three categories under which organizations can apply, including: Mentoring Organizations (1 state), Mentoring Organizations (2 – 10 states), and Mentoring Organizations (11 – 44 states). See the eligibility section for more information.

Statutory Authority

Any awards under this solicitation would be made under statutory authority provided by a full-year appropriations act for FY 2022. As of the writing of this solicitation, the Department of Justice is operating under a short-term "Continuing Resolution": no full-year appropriation for the Department has been enacted for FY 2022.

Specific Information

This program supports the implementation and delivery of mentoring services to youth populations that are at risk or high risk for juvenile delinquency, victimization, and juvenile justice system involvement. Mentoring services can be one-on-one, group, peer, or a combination of these types. Applicants must initiate mentoring services to youth who are 17 years old or younger at the time of admission to the program. Mentors must be an adult (age 18 or older), or in cases where peer mentoring models are being implemented, an older peer and under adult supervision. Funding is encouraged to support new mentoring matches, but can also support existing mentoring matches through program completion. However, the applicant must specify the number of new and existing matches to be served during the project period in the required Executive Summary Chart (see Additional Application Components section).

For this solicitation, the target population should include those youth who are at risk or high risk for delinquency or victimization and/or are involved in the juvenile justice system. For this solicitation, OJJDP defines at-risk and high-risk youth as youth who are most likely to become involved in the juvenile justice system because they: possess certain risk factors in key life domain areas (i.e., individual, family, school, community); are already involved in the juvenile justice system; and/or reside in environments that have high rates of parental incarceration, community violence, drug markets, gang concentration, and failing schools.

OJJDP also highly encourages applicants to target mentoring services to underserved populations. For this solicitation, OJJDP defines underserved youth as those who demonstrate need but have not participated in mentoring services due to a; shortage of screened and trained mentors; special physical or mental challenges; having an incarcerated parent; having a parent in the military, including a deployed parent; residing in a detention or correctional facility; being a Tribal member; being lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or questioning; or other analogous barriers to accessing mentors.

Funds may not be used to deliver training and technical assistance (TTA) as part of the proposed project. OJJDP supports the National Mentoring Resource Center (NMRC) to provide TTA to all OJJDP-funded grantees, including implementation of the National Quality Mentoring System. OJJDP expects funded mentoring organizations to work with NMRC in identifying and receiving TTA. Lead grantee organizations are expected to monitor subgrantee implementation of the specific mentoring program model funded in the application to ensure subgrantee adherence to the model curriculum and specifications.

This solicitation has three separate categories of funding that organizations can apply for based on their eligibility. The following highlights the different funding categories:

Category 1: Mentoring Organizations (1 state). For Category 1, applicants should address the following items in their application:

- Describe how they intend to expand existing mentoring services to an additional state or jurisdiction within the state where they are already providing mentoring services.
- Describe how they will target mentoring services to underserved populations as described above.
- Explain how their mentoring model will directly address the impact of bullying (including cyberbullying) on the youth served in their programs.
- · Address how the program will promote family engagement as part of the program design or approach.

Category 2: Mentoring Organizations (2 to 10 states). For Category 2, applicants should address the following items in their application:

- Broadest reach. Address how the proposed existing mentoring approach will reach a diverse and broad population of youth. OJJDP will consider the following factors in this determination: number of states where the applicant organization can show a history of providing mentoring services through subawards, number of states where the applicant organization proposes to use the awarded grant funds to provide mentoring services, number of program sites where the applicant organization can demonstrate a history of providing mentoring services through subawards, number of program sites where the applicant organization proposes to use the awarded grant funds to provide mentoring services, number of youth served, number of mentors recruited, and diversity (including racial and ethnic diversity) in the youth being served. The range of funding for this category is from \$1 million to \$4 million, and the final recommended funding amount will be based on the availability of federal funding and the demonstration of broadest reach as described above.
- Describe how they will target mentoring services to underserved populations as described above.
- Explain how the proposed mentoring model will directly address the impact of bullying (including cyberbullying) on the youth served in their programs.
- · Address how the program will promote family engagement as part of the program design or approach.

Category 3: Mentoring Organizations (11 to 44 states). For Category 3, applicants should address the following items in their application:

- Broadest reach. Address how the proposed existing mentoring approach will reach a diverse and broad population of youth. OJJDP will consider the following factors in this determination: number of states where the applicant organization can show a history of providing mentoring services through subawards, number of states where the applicant organization proposes to use the awarded grant funds to provide mentoring services, number of program sites where the applicant organization can demonstrate a history of providing mentoring services through subawards, number of program sites where the applicant organization proposes to use the awarded grant funds to provide mentoring services, number of youth served, number of mentors recruited, and diversity (including racial and ethnic diversity) in the youth being served. The range of funding for this category is from \$2 million to \$4 million, and the final recommended funding amount will be based on the availability of federal funding and the demonstration of broadest reach as described above.
- · Describe how they will target mentoring services to underserved populations as described above.
- Explain how the proposed mentoring model will directly address the impact of bullying (including cyberbullying) on the youth served in their programs.
- · Address how the program will promote family engagement as part of the program design or approach.

For all three categories, applicants are expected to submit the following items as separate attachments in Just Grants as part of their application (see also Additional Application Components section):

- A fully executed "Executive Summary Chart" that indicates that number of states and sites where the program currently exists and where program services will be implemented with federal funds as a part of this application.
- A fully executed Mentoring Program Profile document (see Appendix B).
- A "Mentoring Organizational History" that demonstrates the timeframe that the organization has been in operation and providing mentoring services.
- A"Program Model Overview" that describes the program and documents the name and key components of the mentoring program model (i.e., principles/tenets of the program model, mentoring type, expected location, etc.).

Goals, Objectives, Deliverables, and Timeline

Goals

The program's goal is to improve outcomes (such as improved academic performance and reduced school dropout rates) for at-risk and high-risk youth, and reduce negative outcomes (including juvenile delinquency, substance use, and gang participation) through youth mentoring.

Objectives

OJJDP has identified the following specific program objectives:

- Increase or expand reach to the number of at-risk or high-risk youth receiving mentoring services.
- Increase or maintain the number of screened and well-trained mentors, with an emphasis on ensuring the mentors selected reflect the youth they serve.

Develop and implement program design enhancements that align with research and evidence on effective mentoring approaches.

Deliverables

- Provide high-quality mentoring services that meet the needs associated with the target population(s) and that will reduce delinquency or other problem behaviors in at-risk youth. Applicants under all categories should identify the proposed target population(s) and explain how the proposed mentoring approach will appropriately respond to their unique needs in a way that is likely to promote positive outcomes.
- Implement program enhancements for the existing mentoring program in one or more of the six core practice areas
 listed in the Elements of Effective Practice for Mentoring, 4th edition
 (http://www.mentoring.org/images/uploads/Final_Elements_Publication_Fourth.pdf), as highlighted on OJJDP's
 National Mentoring Resource Center website.
- Incorporate family engagement as part of the program design or approach.
- Program sites should include in their application a plan for how the proposed project will ensure diversity, equity and
 inclusion for mentors and youth regardless of their racial or ethnic group; religion; socioeconomic status; gender; or
 other characteristics historically linked to discrimination or exclusion.

The Goals, Objectives, and Deliverables are directly related to the performance measures that show the completed work's results, as discussed under the Application and Submission Information section. Quantitative information provided under Objectives (such as number of youth served, number of mentors recruited, etc.) must match numbers listed in Appendix B: Mentoring Program Profile.

Evidence-Based Programs or Practices

The Department of Justice is committed to advancing work that promotes civil rights and racial equity, increases access to justice, supports crime victims and individuals impacted by the justice system, strengthens community safety and protects the public from crime and evolving threats, and builds trust between law enforcement and the community.

1. Priority Considerations Supporting Executive Order 13985, Advancing Racial Equity and Support for Underserved Communities Through the Federal Government

Consistent with this Executive Order, the term "underserved community" refers to a population sharing a particular characteristic, as well as a geographic community, that has been systematically denied a full opportunity to participate in aspects of economic, social, and civic life or whose members have been historically underserved, marginalized, and adversely affected by inequality. Such communities include, among others, Black people, Hispanics and Latino/a/e people, Native American and other Indigenous peoples of North America (including Alaska Natives, Eskimos, and Aleuts), Asian Americans. Native Hawaiians, and Pacific Islanders.

In support of Executive Order 13985, OJP will:

A. Give priority consideration to applications that include project(s) that will promote racial equity and the removal of barriers to access and opportunity for communities that have been historically underserved, marginalized, and adversely affected by inequality, when making award decisions.

To receive this consideration, the applicant must describe how the proposed project(s) will address potential inequities and barriers to equal opportunity, and/or contribute to greater access to services for underserved and historically marginalized populations.

B. Give priority consideration to applicants that can demonstrate that their capabilities and competencies for implementing their proposed project(s) are enhanced because the applicant (or at least one proposed subrecipient that will receive at least 30% of the requested award funding, as demonstrated in the Budget Worksheet and Budget Narrative) identifies as a culturally specific organization. To receive this additional priority consideration, applicants must describe how being a culturally specific organization (or funding the culturally specific subrecipient organization(s)) will enhance their ability to implement the proposed project(s) and should also specify which culturally specific populations are intended

or expected to be served or to have their needs addressed under the proposed project(s).

Culturally specific organizations are defined for purposes of this solicitation as private nonprofit or Tribal organizations whose primary purpose as a whole is to provide culturally specific services to, among others, Black people, Hispanics and Latino/a/e people, Native American and other Indigenous peoples of North America (including Alaska Natives, Eskimos, and Aleuts), Asian Americans, Native Hawaiians, and/or Pacific Islanders.

Note: Addressing these priority areas is one of many factors that OJP considers in making funding decisions. Receiving priority consideration for one or more priority areas is not a guarantee of an award.

In addition, nothing in this solicitation is intended to, and does not, create any right or benefit, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or in equity by any party against the United States, its departments, agencies, or entities, its officers, employees, or agents, or any other person.

Based on the availability of funding, OJJDP may request that an applicant selected for funding reduce their proposed budget. If funding is reduced, OJJDP will work with a successful grantee to adjust the proposed number of states where funding will be used as well as the number of mentors to be recruited and mentees to be served.

Types of Awards

OJJDP expects to make awards under this solicitation as grants. See the "Administrative, National Policy, and Other Legal

Category 1: Mentoring Organizations (1 state)

Eligible entities are those mentoring organizations that have been in existence for at least 3 years and are currently delivering a structured, standalone mentoring program (i.e., "program x") in 1 state. Applicants must submit a separate attachment labeled "Program Model Overview" to demonstrate the existence of this standalone mentoring program.

As part of the funded program, the primary applicant must either propose to expand the existing mentoring

program to 1 additional state OR 1 additional jurisdiction within the state where they are already providing mentoring services.

The primary applicant must be the "headquarters" office of the mentoring organization. The primary applicant may deliver services through affiliate or partner subawards; however, the proposed subawardees must implement the same mentoring program (i.e., "program x") as the primary applicant.

Category 2: Mentoring Organizations (2 to 10 states)

Eligible entities are those mentoring organizations that have been in existence for at least 3 years and are currently delivering a structured, standalone mentoring program (i.e., "program x") in 2 to 10 states. Applicants must submit a separate attachment labeled "Program Model Overview" to demonstrate the existence of this standalone mentoring program.

The primary applicant must be the "headquarters" office of the mentoring organization. The primary applicant may deliver services through affiliate or partner subawards; however, the proposed subawardees must implement the same mentoring program (i.e., "program x") as the primary applicant.

For the purposes of this category, a primary applicant that forms a partnership with one or more organizations that are delivering different mentoring program models for the purposes of meeting the multistate requirement is not eligible to apply.

Category 3: Mentoring Organizations (11 to 44 states)

Eligible entities are those mentoring organizations that have been in existence for at least 3 years and are currently delivering a structured, standalone mentoring program (i.e., "program x") in 11 to 44 states. Applicants must submit a separate attachment labeled "Program Model Overview" to demonstrate the existence of this standalone mentoring program.

The primary applicant must be the "headquarters" office of the mentoring organization. The primary applicant may deliver services through affiliate or partner subawards; however, the proposed subawardees must implement the same mentoring program (i.e., "program x") as the primary applicant.

For the purposes of this category, a primary applicant that forms a partnership with one or more organizations that are delivering different mentoring program models for the purposes of meeting the multistate requirement is not eligible to apply.

All recipients and subrecipients (including any for-profit organization) must forgo any profit or management fee.

To advance Executive Order 13929 Safe Policing for Safe Communities, the Attorney General determined that all state, local, and university or college law enforcement agencies must be certified by an approved independent credentialing body or have started the certification process, to be eligible for FY 2022 DOJ discretionary grant funding. To become certified, the law enforcement agency must meet two mandatory conditions: (1) the agency's use-of-force policies adhere to all applicable federal, state, and local laws and (2) the agency's use-of-force policies prohibit chokeholds except in situations where use of deadly force is allowed by law. The certification requirement also applies to law enforcement agencies receiving DOJ discretionary grant funding through a subaward. The applicant will need to review the Standard Applicant Information in JustGrants and make edits as needed. Within this section, the applicant will need to: add ZIP Codes for areas affected by the project; confirm its Authorized Representative; and verify and confirm the organization's unique entity identifier, legal name, and address.

Proposal Abstract

A proposal abstract (no more than 400 words) summarizing the proposed project, including the purpose of the project, primary activities, expected outcomes, the service area, intended beneficiaries and subrecipients (if known), will be completed in the JustGrants web-based form. This abstract should be written in the third person and will be made publicly available on the OJP website if the project is awarded.

Proposal Narrative

The proposal narrative should be submitted as an attachment in JustGrants. The attached document should be double-spaced, using a standard 12-point font; have no less than 1-inch margins; and should not exceed 30 pages. Pages should be numbered and submitted as an attachment. If the proposal narrative fails to comply with these length restrictions, OJJDP may consider such noncompliance in peer review and in final award decision.

The following sections must be included as part of the proposal narrative:

a. Description of the Issue

Applicants should briefly describe the nature and scope of the problem that the program will address (e.g., juvenile crime, gang activity, underage drinking, drug abuse, truancy, youth employment, school performance, etc.). The applicant should use data to provide evidence that the problem exists, demonstrate the size and scope of the problem, and document the effects of the problem on the target population and the larger community. Any data or research referenced in the narrative should include information about the source of the data and/or a citation. Applicants should describe the target population and any previous or current attempts to address the problem. Applicants should describe any research or evaluation studies that relate to the problem and contribute to their understanding of its causes and potential solutions. While OJJDP expects applicants to review the research literature for relevant studies, they should also explore whether unpublished local sources of research or evaluation data are available.

b. Project Design and Implementation

Applicants should detail how the project will operate throughout the funding period and describe how they will complete the deliverables stated in the Goals, Objectives, and Deliverables section.
