#### Overview

The <u>U.S. Department of Justice</u> (DOJ), <u>Office of Justice Programs</u> (OJP), <u>Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention</u> (OJJDP) seeks applications for funding to develop, enhance, or expand arts programs for justice-involved youth. This program furthers the DOJ's mission by supporting high-quality arts programs for current and previous justice-involved youth, including Tribal and Indigenous youth, to reduce juvenile delinquency, recidivism, and/or other problem and high-risk behaviors. OJJDP defines justice-involved youth as those participating in court-ordered diversion programs, in detention, correctional, or other residential facilities, and/or who are on probation due to a delinquency finding by juvenile court.

This solicitation incorporates guidance provided in the OJP Grant Application Resource Guide, which provides additional information for applicants to prepare and submit applications to OJP for funding. If this solicitation expressly modifies any provision in the OJP Grant Application Resource Guide, the applicant is to follow the guidelines in this solicitation as to that provision.

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# **Program Description**

#### Overview

OJP is committed to advancing work that promotes civil rights and racial equity, increases access to justice, supports crime victims and individuals impacted by the justice system, strengthens community safety and protects the public from crime and evolving threats, and builds trust between law enforcement and the community.

OJJDP's guiding philosophy is to enhance the welfare of America's youth and broaden their opportunities for a better future. To bring these goals to fruition, OJJDP is leading efforts to transform the juvenile justice system into one that will <a href="Treat Children as Children">Treat Children as Children</a>; Serve Children at Home, With Their Families, in their Communities; and Open Up Opportunities for System-Involved Youth. OJJDP encourages all proposed applications that work with youth to highlight how the proposed program aligns with these priorities.

OJJDP envisions a juvenile justice system centered on the strengths, needs, and voices of youth and families. Young people and family members with lived experience are vital resources for understanding and reaching persons involved or at risk of involvement with youth-serving systems. OJJDP asks stakeholders to join us in sustainably integrating bold, transformative youth and family partnership strategies into our daily work. OJJDP believes in achieving positive outcomes for youth, families, and communities through meaningful partnership and active partnerships, ensuring they play a central role in collaboratively developing solutions.

Applicants must describe how their proposed project/program will integrate and sustain meaningful youth and family partnerships into their project plan and budget. Depending on the nature of an applicant's proposed project, youth and family partnership could consist of one or more of the following:

- Individual-level partnership in case planning and direct service delivery (before, during, and after contact with youth-serving systems).
- Agency-level partnership (e.g., in policy, practice, and program development, implementation, and evaluation; staffing; advisory bodies; budget development).
- System-level partnership (e.g., in strategic planning activities, system improvement initiatives, advocacy strategies, reform efforts).

With this solicitation, OJJDP seeks to support high-quality arts programs for justice-involved youth to reduce juvenile delinquency, recidivism, and/or other problem and high-risk behaviors. This project seeks to support and strengthen collaborations between arts-based organizations and juvenile justice systems to develop, expand, or enhance effective interventions, which may involve emphasizing the unique capability of the art interventions to enhance protective factors and reduce risk factors that lead to justice system involvement, including individual characteristics, social influences, and community conditions.

## **Statutory Authority**

#### Specific Information

OJJDP has a history of interest and investment in the potential of the arts to positively impact youth development and reduce or prevent juvenile delinquency and/or recidivism. Arts and justice collaborations between OJJDP and the National Endowment for the Arts include the Youth Arts Development Project in 1995, publishing the *Guide to Promising Practices in Arts Programs for Juvenile Offenders in Detention and Corrections* in 2002, and OJJDP's Model Programs Guide literature review entitled <a href="Arts-Based Programs and Arts Therapies for At-Risk, Justice-Involved, and Traumatized Youths">Arts-Based Programs and Arts Therapies for At-Risk, Justice-Involved, and Traumatized Youths</a> (updated in 2021). OJJDP has also supported arts-based organizations and justice partnerships to work with youth on a variety of initiatives, including arts-based mentoring programs, restorative justice, and culturally based Tribal youth programs.

While more research is needed to explore how the arts can directly impact justice-involved youth, existing evidence shows that the arts can promote positive outcomes and achieve broader societal impacts, including a stronger sense of community. According to OJJDP's Arts-Based Programs and Arts Therapies for At-Risk, Justice-Involved, and Traumatized Youths literature review, the arts can help address emotional and problem behaviors for at-risk justice-involved youth. Participation in arts programming can foster the development of prosocial behaviors, including learning new skills, developing new talents, and expressing thoughts and ideas creatively and therapeutically. High-quality arts programming in conjunction with trauma-informed therapeutic resources can provide opportunities for justice-involved youth to process trauma, improve coping skills, and build resiliency and positive emotions (Quillen, 2020)[1]

For example, in therapeutic settings, music lessons can be an effective strategy for decreasing unproductive behaviors and supporting productive behaviors by providing opportunities for self-expression, self-reflection, and a stronger sense of self (Quillen, 2020).

Evaluations of incarcerated populations participating in arts programs showed positive results (Middleton, Harris, and Ackerman, 2019; Gussak, 2007).[2] For example, incarcerated youth reported improved attitude and mood, compliance with staff and rules, increased socialization skills, reduced depressive symptoms, improved confidence, and other positive skills (Middleton, Harris, and Ackerman, 2019). Similarly, restorative justice-based media-arts programs have enabled justice-involved youth to process and implement the program principles and express themselves through digital storytelling (Morris, 2018).[3] For youth reentering their communities, the arts can strengthen social and emotional development, including self-awareness, conflict resolution, and better decision-making, resulting in broader societal impacts.

This project seeks to support and strengthen collaborations between arts-based

organizations and juvenile justice systems to develop, expand, or enhance promising and effective interventions that provide access to high-quality arts programs with and for current or previous justice-involved youth to reduce juvenile delinquency, recidivism, and/or other problem and high-risk behaviors. OJJDP defines justice-involved youth as those participating in court-ordered diversion programs in detention, correctional, or other residential facilities, and/or are on probation due to a delinquency finding by juvenile court.

Possible points of engagement with justice-involved youth can occur across juvenile justice systems, ranging from arts education for youth in secure facilities such as juvenile detention and confinement, arts programs as alternatives to incarceration, and/ or as a strategy to support successful reentry into communities. High-quality arts programs are those that provide opportunities for rigorous artistic exploration, skill building and culminating events, and that provide youth with mentorship from artists. Arts programs may include but are not limited to visual arts, performing arts, filmmaking, and literary arts.

Successful applications will include a theory of change that explains how the proposed intervention seeks to use the arts to impact justice-involved youth. These interventions may involve emphasizing their unique capability to promote protective factors and reduce risk factors that lead to justice system involvement. These factors can include individual characteristics, social influences, and community conditions.

#### Goals, Objectives, and Deliverables

#### Goals

Goal 1: Reduce juvenile delinquency, recidivism, and/or other problem and high-risk behaviors of justice-involved youth through the development, enhancement, and/or expansion of high-quality, culturally relevant arts programs.

Goal 2: Increase participation of justice-involved youth in high-quality arts programs that are in alignment with OJJDP's overarching priority areas and that integrate and sustain meaningful youth and family partnerships in their program design and budget.

#### **Objectives**

An applicant should address the objectives that are relevant to their proposed program/

Objective 4: Reduce risk factors and increase protective factors of justice-involved youth through participation in high-quality arts programs.

#### Deliverables

Grant deliverables include the following:

- Collaborative partnerships between juvenile courts and arts-based resources to provide justice-involved youth with high-quality arts programs for diversion and probation.
- Collaborative partnerships between juvenile detention, correctional, and other residential facilities and arts-based resources to provide high-quality arts programs for justice-involved youth.
- High-quality community-based arts programs for current or previous justice-involved youth
- Culturally relevant and responsive community-based programs for racial and ethnic minority justice-involved youth.

To receive this consideration, the applicant must describe how the proposed project(s) will address potential racial inequities and contribute to greater access to services and opportunities for communities that have been historically underserved, marginalized, and adversely affected by inequality, and identify how the project design and implementation will specifically incorporate the input or participation of those communities and populations disproportionately impacted by crime, violence, and the criminal justice system overall. Examples addressing this requirement include, but are not limited to, the following: budgeted project planning and/or implementation meetings with community stakeholders representing historically underserved and marginalized communities; outreach and/or public awareness campaigns specifically tailored to historically underserved and marginalized communities to encourage participation in the proposed project(s); budgeted incorporation of members representing historically underserved and marginalized communities in program evaluation, surveys, or other means of project feedback; and partnership with organizations that primarily serve communities that have been historically underserved, marginalized, and adversely affected by inequality.

B. Applicants that demonstrate that their capabilities and competencies for implementing their proposed project(s) are enhanced because they (or at least one proposed subrecipient that will receive **at least 40%** of the requested award funding, as demonstrated in the Budget Web-Based Form) identify as a *culturally specific organization*.

To receive this additional priority consideration, applicants must describe how being a culturally specific organization (or funding the culturally specific subrecipient organization (s)) will enhance their ability to implement the proposed project(s) and should also specify which populations are intended or expected to be served or to have their needs addressed under the proposed project(s).

Culturally specific organizations are defined for the purposes of this solicitation as private nonprofit or Tribal organizations whose primary purpose as a whole is to provide culturally specific services to racial and ethnic groups, including, among others, Black people, Hispanic and Latino people, Native American and other Indigenous peoples of North America (including Alaska Native, Eskimo, and Aleut), Asian Americans, Native Hawaiians,

and/or Pacific Islanders.

C. OJJDP will give priority consideration to applicants that demonstrate a commitment to ensuring fairness, equity, and access to justice for all children and families regardless of their race or ethnicity; religion; socioeconomic status; gender; age; mental health; cognitive, sensory, or physical disability; sexual orientation or gender identity or expression; geographic location; or other characteristics historically linked to discrimination or exclusion.

To receive this priority consideration, applicants must include in their application a plan that describes how the applicant will incorporate these values and priorities into their program design.

Note: Addressing these priority areas is one of many factors that OJP considers in making funding decisions. Receiving priority consideration for one or more priority areas does not guarantee an award.

This abstract should be in paragraph form without bullets or tables, written in the third person, and exclude personally identifiable information. Abstracts will be made publicly available on the OJP and USASpending.gov websites if the project is awarded. See the OJP Grant Application Resource Guide for an example of a proposal abstract.

#### **Proposal Narrative**

The proposal narrative should be submitted as an attachment in JustGrants. The attached document should be double-spaced, using a standard 12-point font; have no less than 1-inch margins; and should not exceed 30 numbered pages. If the proposal narrative fails to comply with these length restrictions, OJJDP may consider such noncompliance in peer review and in final award decision. Tables, charts, and graphs can be included in the program narrative and can be created in a legible font smaller than 12 point. Tables, charts, and graphs will not count toward the page limit.

The Proposal Narrative must include the following sections:

#### a. Description of the Issue

Applicants must describe the issue, which includes the extent of juvenile delinquency in their jurisdiction(s) using the most recent data, including offense type, and demographic data (i.e., race and ethnicity, age, and gender). Describe why this project/these proposed activities are necessary (significance/value) or address a need. Please include supporting information. The statement should include how the arts can reduce delinquency, recidivism, or other problem and high-risk behaviors for justice-involved youth ages 10–17.

Applicants focusing on Tribal and Indigenous justice-involved youth ages 10–17 must describe the extent of juvenile delinquency using the most recent data that include offense type, age, and gender. Applicants can describe how historical trauma contributes to delinquency, recidivism, and/or other problem and high-risk behaviors.

# b. Project Design and Implementation

Describe the theory of change that explains how the proposed intervention seeks to use the arts to impact justice-involved youth. Describe proposed strategies to address the needs identified in the Description of the Issue section. List the activities and describe how they relate to the stated objectives. Activities are the specific actions to be undertaken to fulfill the program's objectives and reach the program's goal(s). Provide a detailed description of the method(s) to be used to carry out each activity.

Applicants should describe their vision and plan for meaningfully and sustainably

integrating youth and family partnership into their proposed project. Applicants should address any corresponding budget implications in their application's budget detail and budget narrative. For resources/guidance on effective youth and family partnership strategies and practices, click <a href="here">here</a>.

If an applicant believes that their project design is in no way amenable to incorporating youth and family partnership, the applicant should instead provide a detailed explanation and justification for excluding this element.

If the applicant is seeking priority consideration for Priority 1(A), it should address in this section how the proposed project(s) will promote racial equity and the removal of barriers to access and opportunity for communities that have been historically underserved, marginalized, and adversely affected by inequality, and identify how the project design and implementation will specifically incorporate the input or participation of these communities.

If the applicant is seeking priority consideration for Priority 1(C), it should address in this section how the proposed project(s) will ensure fairness, equity, and access to justice for all children and families regardless of their religion; gender; age; mental health; cognitive, sensory, or physical disability; sexual orientation or gender identity; or other characteristics historically linked to discrimination or exclusion not already identified under Priority 1(A).

#### c. Capabilities and Competencies
